



Curriculum Intent

Our school curriculum is much richer and deeper than the National Curriculum content with the thread of our REAL wheel values, our Learning Super Powers and the UNCRC running through it. Our school curriculum aims to give children the essential skills and understanding to be able to articulate their knowledge confidently and with authority. They will be able to reflect on their nation and about the world around them, with consideration for the human legacy of our actions both past and present. We believe that every child has a potentially untapped interest or area of expertise and we aim to instill in them a lifelong passion for learning and the skills to access this knowledge.

How?

We strive to do this by:

- underpinning our school curriculum with our REAL wheel values and Learning Super Powers, promoting the skills for pupils to become Responsible, Enthusiastic,
 Aspirational Leaders, and developing their powers of adaptability, kindness, determination, self-control, independence and communication;
- developing themes for learning centred around the Rights of the Child and British
 Values that will encourage children to play their role as global citizens and prepare them for life in the 21st century;
- creating a progressive, ambitious, innovative curriculum which builds on prior learning and that is relevant to local culture and history, current affairs and events;
- positively promoting the power of making mistakes and taking risks as a crucial part of learning, building resilience alongside their collaborative and independent learning;
- providing pupils with a breadth of opportunities to develop essential life skills through an innovative curriculum that encourages children to ask and answer questions;
- reinforcing and revisiting Literacy and Numeracy skills in context;
- encouraging creativity in thought, action and presentation e.g. in their application of technology or cross-curricular learning;
- modelling for children how to think more deeply;
- developing a sense of fun and excitement about the world around us and encouraging children to continually explore and investigate;
- providing a curriculum that is challenging yet accessible and inclusive to all children regardless of ability, faith, culture, disability or race and promotes the importance of healthy minds and bodies;
- using trips, visits and visits to local/ regional places of interest to enhance learning and inspire children;
- drawing on the expertise of parents and our school community to share and develop skills.
